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FOREWORD

Thank you for joining the Half-Million Mobilization's fifty-day journey of prayer from Easter to Pentecost. God has done his deepest works in my life through prolonged times of prayer. In my first church, a young layman by the name of Rob asked if we could hold an all-Saturday prayer meeting. I was a busy young pastor and only reluctantly agreed. In spite of myself, God did a deep work in my life that day, and his Spirit was poured out in a special way on our church in the services that followed.

I'm asking the Lord to do a deep work in your life, in our church, through our church in these next fifty days. Will you enter into this prayer time with that expectation?

Our Half-Million Mobilization theme this year is *Blessing Our Community*. I hope this time in prayer will do a deep work in our lives and our churches to be a mighty force for blessing our communities throughout this year ahead. The prayer time that led up to that first Christian Pentecost started as a sit-in. In fact, Jesus commanded his disciples to wait until they were clothed with power (see Luke 24:49). But when the Day of Pentecost came, God's manifest, miraculous, powerful presence resulted in those early believers exploding from sitting in to being sent out.

As we encounter his divine power through these fifty days of prayer, may the Lord mobilize all Nazarenes in unity, empowering us to bless our communities, bring people to Jesus, and become Christlike disciples.

PREFACE

Easter to Pentecost 2024 marks the third year that the Church of the Nazarene in Canada and the United States is coming together unified in prayer. We will pray for pastors, the laity, the church at large, and all who do not yet know Jesus Christ as their Savior.

From May 1 to Pentecost Sunday in 2022, Nazarenes prayed for the *protection*, *direction*, and *revelation* of the Church of the Nazarene. The call to pray was followed by a call to speak. Through this initiative, the Spirit overwhelmingly confirmed that our focus must be on *unity*, *blessing*, *bringing*, and *becoming*. God hears and answers the prayers of God's people (see 1 John 5:14–15).

From Easter to Pentecost in 2023, we prayed for the *mission*, *vision*, and *strategies* of the Church of the Nazarene. Again, the Spirit spoke, filling the hearts and minds of God's people with four heart cries that are the foundations of the regional vision today:

- 1. The importance of "mobilizing all Nazarenes in **unity**;" we are united in Christ Jesus.
- 2. Calling local churches to engage in "blessing our communities;" to get out from within the walls of our churches and meet people where they are, trusting God's prevenient grace to go ahead of us.
- 3. Nurturing hearts for "**bringing** people to Jesus" through the Spirit's saving grace.
- 4. Growing in faith and holiness by "becoming Christlike disciples" through the Spirit's sanctifying grace.

We are calling the top-level strategy *The Cycle of Resurgence*. This cycle is the implementation of annual plans to fulfill our vision as the Spirit has graciously provided.



Starting Easter through Pentecost 2024, *Blessing Our Community* will be the focus of our prayers. The emphasis for 2024 is for local churches to engage with people in their immediate communities in order to serve them and show them the hope of Christ for their lives. Blessing our community is where it starts. We begin by making friends, building relationships, and attending to those divine appointments the Lord sets up for us when we serve.

This prayer journal contains weekly themes related to the heart cry of blessing our community. Each daily devotional will focus on a scripture related to this idea. We will pray for *The Cycle of Resurgence: Blessing Our Community*.

We encourage you to join in! Read and pray daily following this Prayer Journal.

Easter Sunday, March 31, 2024



Mark 10:45

For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many.

Scripture Insights

Death on a cross was a form of execution the Romans used to intimidate the people they had conquered and terrorize them into submission. It was a very painful way to die. But it was also degrading. They not only wanted to make you suffer, but they also wanted to strip you of your honor. As such, the cross was symbolic of the unstoppable military power of the Roman Empire and a symbol of shame and humiliation for those who were their enemies.

But Jesus changed the symbol. Jesus chose the cross. He died because his obedience led him there. He laid his life down as a ransom for many. Jesus took the symbol of Caesar's raw power and made it speak of God's sacrificial love. He took the symbol of shame and humiliation and made it speak of servanthood and salvation. "Therefore God exalted him to the highest place and gave him the name that is above every name, that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue acknowledge that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father" (Philippians 2:9–11).

When God raised Jesus from the dead, it was a way of saying *this way is better*. The resurrection vindicated the path of obedience that Jesus had chosen and declared that the real way to life is one that stops grasping and starts giving. Suffering love and servanthood to "the least of these" (see Matthew 25:40) may look like a step down, but in the kingdom of God, you have to step down to step up. The God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ takes humiliation and turns it into exaltation.

Today's Prayer

Father, thank you that Jesus's death and resurrection show us that the greatest life is the one given for the sake of others. Help us lay down our lives in the service of your kingdom.

Monday, April 1, 2024



Matthew 22:37-40

Jesus replied: "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind.' This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: 'Love your neighbor as yourself.' All the Law and the Prophets hang on these two commandments."

Scripture Insights

So now what? With the refrain of Easter Sunday echoing in our ears—He is risen! He is risen indeed!—what are we to do next? Said another way, how are we to live in light of the empty tomb? Thankfully Jesus answers our questions in today's scripture.

Our first response to Christ's resurrection is to love God with all that we are—heart, soul, and mind—engaging all of our being in love and worship of God. But that's not where it ends, for Jesus also reminded us to love our neighbors as we love ourselves. This second command encapsulates everything *else* that the law and the prophets commanded of those who love God. Our second appropriate response to the empty tomb is to love our neighbors, which could also be called blessing our communities. This command calls us to pray for our neighbors, to see them as people made in the image of God (even if they have not yet come into relationship with Christ), and to love them unconditionally.

So, what now? We are called to love!

Today's Prayer

Loving God, thank you for the gift of your Son, and for his sacrifice and resurrection! Today we commit all of ourselves to loving you. Please help us to also love others so that our communities might be blessed.

Ezekiel 36:26-27

I will give you a new heart and put a new spirit in you; I will remove from you your heart of stone and give you a heart of flesh. And I will put my Spirit in you and move you to follow my decrees and be careful to keep my laws.

Scripture Insights

There is gentleness in today's scripture. In response to a heart of stone, and the implication that we are unable to follow the decrees and laws of God, God gives. When we have a deep need for transformation, our good God gives us a new heart. When we are struggling with hardness within ourselves brought on by judgmentalism, self-righteousness, or us/them thinking, God takes that from us and gives us a heart of flesh. We are offered the gift of a new spirit. And it isn't any old spirit—it's God's Spirit.

And then what does God's Spirit do? Enables us to be who we were created to be—in right relationship with God and right relationship with ourselves and right relationship with our neighbors. After all, God's decrees and laws are about those relationships! Throughout Scripture, we are commanded to care for the people on the margins, and we are invited by Jesus himself to love our enemies. If we lived like that, what an incredible blessing we would be to our communities.

Our giving God has a gift for us. Will we receive it?

Today's Prayer

God, we need you. On our own, our hearts are like stone. Without your Spirit we are nothing. Heal us, fill us, and use us to bless all of our neighbors as we live graciously, gently, and generously as you do.

Luke 22:27

For who is greater, the one who is at the table or the one who serves? Is it not the one who is at the table? But I am among you as one who serves.

Scripture Insights

Recently, our family took a trip to Orlando, Florida, on an adventure to Disney World. I was fascinated when we entered the park, watching as thousands of others around us checked reality at the gate in order to immerse themselves in the fantasies each Disney experience offered. It was almost as if entire personas changed—from how they behaved to what they wore—to conform to the ways of the magic kingdom. As I get older, I find it more enjoyable to sit on a park bench and observe the characters walking by than to visit the attractions with my kids. And by "characters," I don't mean the ones employed by the park—I mean the guests! It is incredible how powerfully the Disney atmosphere can transform a person to adopt the ways of its kingdom.

In today's scripture, Jesus quickly reminds the disciples how easy it is to conform to whatever kingdom we are leaning into at the moment. Even after Jesus intimately serves the Passover meal in the upper room, sharing the significance of the moment, they immediately fall back into a worldly mindset of power and position rather than recognizing that the way of God's kingdom is humility and servitude.

As we look to bless our communities, let us remember Jesus's example and the power of his influence to transform our lives to reflect the way of his kingdom through serving rather than being served.

Today's Prayer

Dear Lord, as we strive to bless our communities, help us to shed worldly influences that entice us to pursue selfish ambitions that sabotage our witness. Transform our hearts to embrace humility and servitude, mirroring the ways of your kingdom. Guide us to serve others in our neighborhoods with love and selflessness, as exemplified by Jesus.

John 21:12-13

Jesus said to them, "Come and have breakfast." None of the disciples dared ask him, "Who are you?" They knew it was the Lord. Jesus came, took the bread and gave it to them, and did the same with the fish.

Scripture Insights

Jesus is a master at setting people up. In the broader scene where we find our verses for today, the disciples had been out all night doing what they knew best—fishing. Whether it was out of uncertainty of their future purpose or simply the need to eat, they returned after Jesus's death to doing what they knew. Though they had fished all their lives, this time was a bust. Then Jesus showed up, gave them instructions, and turned failure into overwhelming success.

Jesus was setting them up to reintroduce his purpose for the rest of their lives. As he had done so many times before, Jesus invited his friends to join him in the breaking of bread together, where he engaged Peter. *Peter, if you love me, feed my sheep. Peter, if you love me, follow me.*

Jesus continues to engage you and me today with the same purpose—first, to join him in intimate fellowship, then to follow him into his mission of loving others and blessing them in practical ways in order to share the good news of full salvation. May we be obedient.

Father, as Jesus draws us into fellowship and mission, may your Spirit enable us to respond in obedience and empower us to love and bless those around us through our deeds and words. We deeply desire to bear much fruit as we abide in Christ.

Scripture Insights

Scripture Insights

Having a hero in your life is worth celebrating. Almost all of us would be thrilled to celebrate the influence of someone who has encouraged us along the path of life. Luke 10:37b

Jesus told him, "Go and do likewise."

Scripture Insights

These powerful words are a direct challenge from Jesus given at the end of a story aimed to answer questions from an expert in the law who first asked Jesus what he must do to inherit eternal life. When he and Jesus agreed that the key was loving God and loving neighbor, the expert then persisted, asking Jesus who his neighbor was.

This is when Jesus launches into a story that reveals an unlikely hero—a Samaritan turns out to be the good guy in the story. The Samaritan, unlike the priest and the Levite, was the only one who acknowledged the need, ran to the need, and met the need of a man who had been robbed and left for dead. Jesus answers the question of who is a neighbor by illustrating what a good neighbor does. Good neighbors see needs, go toward needs, and meet needs.

Jesus is telling us how to bless our communities—by doing what this hero of the story did. See the need, move toward the need, meet the need. Go and do likewise!

Today's Prayer

Jesus, help us be good neighbors by seeing needs, moving toward needs, and doing what we can to meet the needs in our communities. Teach us what it means to bless our communities today!

Proverbs 19:17

Whoever is kind to the poor lends to the LORD, and he will reward them for what they have done.

Scripture Insights

While attending seminary, I worked as a personal banker at a local community bank. Whenever someone inquired about borrowing money, the most important questions to answer were whether the borrower had the credit to support the application and the ability to repay.

The author of Proverbs wants us to take note that this is never a question when we consider investing ourselves in the lives of the poor. When we give to others and extend kindness to those in need, we are lending not to someone with questionable character or an uncertain ability to repay but to the One with perfect credit—the Lord of all creation, who always repays with abundant interest. In this divine transaction, we can be confident in the integrity of the borrower. Our heavenly Father is never at risk of bankruptcy, and our investments in God's kingdom are always safe and secure.

Our reward comes not in the form of material wealth but in the form of love, joy, peace, and a deep sense of purpose as we join God as partners in seeing the new creation lived out in the here and now. Our trust in God's character, God's commitment to justice, and God's faithfulness in rewarding our acts of kindness should embolden us to live generously.

As you offer your kindness and compassion to others, remember that you're engaging in an exchange with the greatest rewards that far surpass earthly riches.

Today's Prayer

Heavenly Father, thank you for the privilege of investing in your kingdom. May our acts of kindness be multiplied by your Spirit, and may we trust in your faithfulness to see the new creation revealed through them.

Acts 20:35

In everything I did, I showed you that by this kind of hard work we must help the weak, remembering the words the Lord Jesus himself said: "It is more blessed to give than to receive."

Scripture Insights

Paul does not merely tell us what Jesus said; he also tells us we must *remember* it. Why? Because we have a tendency to be more aware of our personal needs than of our blessings, which makes us less likely to be generous with others. Generosity and gratitude are linked. We will never be generous people until we are grateful people. Once we are grateful, we will have no trouble becoming generous.

The work of blessing is also the work of remembering: the provision we've given, the blessing we've already received, the grace that has been freely distributed to us, and the love of God that covers. When we remember how we've been blessed, we become a blessing to others. Gratitude first, and generosity will always follow.

How has God blessed you? What provision has he provided? What spiritual giftings has he bestowed? What opportunities has he placed before you? What protection has he given you? Don't just think about it—thank him for it.

Today's Prayer

Jesus, our desire is to be like you. You gave your life so we wouldn't have to, and you gave your life so we would know how to. Make us aware of your work in our life that we are ignorant of. Do not allow us to retain the spirit of spoiled children.

Matthew 5:16

In the same way, let your light shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven.

Scripture Insights

The older I get, the clearer I am that my light and deeds aren't what God has in mind in today's scripture—but rather deeds prompted by him, that emit his light. When we fail to walk by the Spirit, our community ministries can be good but not best, safe but not stunning, a form of godliness yet void of power (see 2 Timothy 3:5). But God still speaks. Sometimes a counterintuitive, bold, and better way emerges.

Avoid the sequence problem. Don't prepare a cautious, ordinary ministry idea and then ask God to bless it. Ask God what is needed most, now, here? Answers really do come—often novel, fun, even scary in scale. That's why you'll need confirmation (prayer, counsel, the Word).

Ministering outside your comfort zone is exactly where good deeds glorify the Father. Your Godward courage is what emits light before others. David Brooks writes in Second Mountain, "You might think a bright personality would come from an unburdened life, but if you look closely at joyful people you notice very often the most incandescent souls have taken on the heaviest burdens."

What is the Spirit saving to you today?

Lord, we're exhausted by limitless good things. They don't even seem to bear much fruit. Get us on your agenda. What is needed most, now, here? Please show us and equip us, for your name's sake.

1 Samuel 12:24

But be sure to fear the LORD and serve him faithfully with all your heart; consider what great things he has done for you.

Scripture Insights

Today's beautiful scripture is actually an admonition issued by the prophet Samuel in a stern address to Israel. Previously a nation governed by judges, the Israelites decided they wanted a king, as was the custom of the surrounding nations. Samuel was not pleased—God alone is King, he warns. Yet, when he takes the matter before the Lord, God instructs Samuel to give the people their way. The resulting domino effect would change the destiny of Israel forever.

Samuel understands well that the people have chosen a lesser way. He knows also that God is faithful and merciful and will not turn his face from his children. Actions have consequences, he portends. Nevertheless, he continues, the fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom, and a wise person lives with a grateful heart

We're not so different today. Though we have stumbled many times, we are awestruck by the fear of the Lord and the demonstration of his continuing grace to save and sanctify us on our journeys of faith.

Ponder the words of this poignant African American spiritual that is familiar to many still today:

Were you there when they crucified my Lord?
Were you there when they nailed him to the tree?
Where you there when God raised him from the tomb?
Sometimes it causes me to tremble, tremble, tremble...

Even in darkness light dawns for the upright, for those who are gracious and compassionate and righteous.

Scripture Insights

In a world where evil seems to get its way, shattered lives and chaotic circumstances are too common in our communities. The question is, can we Christians afford to be inconsequential to the world around us when we proclaim that our God is good, gracious, and compassionate?

In reading Psalm 112:4, we can realize that, just as God desires for us to be like him in our being, it is also his desire for us to be like him in our doing. Therefore, being gracious, compassionate, and righteous should be an integral part of our holy living just as they are the intrinsic nature of our God, expressed clearly in Psalms 111 and 112. It is like the saying, "Like father, like children!"

Scripture Insights

Peter reminds us that we have each been created by God to fulfill unique and extraordinary purposes on this earth. Therefore, we are ambassadors for Christ, as though God were making an appeal through us; we beg you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God.

Scripture Insights

One of my hobbies is to restore old muscle cars from the 1960s and '70s. While I enjoy turning old, rusted metal into beautifully restored classics, it does take a tremendous amount of work. When I don't know how to put something together or properly restore it, I often look for tutorials on YouTube. YouTube is a great place to learn new things, but I've noticed it is much easier to watch the video than to do the work!

We are called to go to church, read our Bible, and grow spiritually, but sometimes we forget to intentionally leverage what we have learned to bring transformation to the people around us. Today's scripture demonstrates that God is not a passive observer, and we are not called to be either. God is entreating people—urgently pleading in order to persuade them—and he desires to do that through us! God is engaging our community with our stories and experiences to prove that transformation is real.

Don't be a passive observer. Take everything you have learned as a follower of Jesus and use it to passionately engage others and transform lives!

Matthew 28:18-20

Then Jesus came to them and said, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age."

Scripture Insights

It's not enough to love God. The desire of our hearts must be to live life in obedience to the direct commands of Jesus. Today's scripture captures the relationship and transfer of authority from the Father to Jesus, who modeled a life in obedience to the heart of the Father. In his authority, Jesus gave us direct commands to *go, make disciples, baptize*, and *teach*. Jesus is the door of grace who gives us access to the God who made a way for his Spirit to dwell within us.

My dad was in the military, and that experience formed his worldview and relationship with the Father. I have had the pleasure of witnessing him live under the authority of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit since I was five. Do you know someone who lives on a need-to-know basis, trusting the Holy Spirit's leading, especially in the context of relationships and discipleship? Discipleship happens in the context of relationship, and relationships move at the speed of trust.

Just what the doctor ordered! In Luke 10:33, Jesus is sharing the story of the Good Samaritan. For James, the ideal community was one that took God at his word. They put their faith into practice. They resisted temptation, overcame testing, and cared for widows, orphans, and the sick. Their faith showed up in acts of kindness, acts of grace, and acts of love. This was a community driven by what Jesus called the greatest commandments—to love the Lord our God and to love our neighbor. James wraps his letter in the prayer of faith, both in the beginning and the end, suggesting that prayer is the natural expression of faith for any believer—whether ill, in turmoil, or in moments of rejoicing.

We are encouraged to call for the elders to anoint and pray for the sick. The result, according to James 5:15–16, will be healing and forgiveness. These are the ingredients needed in our desperate, dying world. As carriers of the presence of the almighty God, the church should live God's Word boldly. Praying for the healing of the spiritually and physically sick is an outward expression of an inward trust in God and his power. It is the church living loudly and boldly for Christ.

"Clothes make the man." At least, that's what my dad said when it was time to dress up. What I didn't know was that he was quoting Mark Twain, who was paraphrasing Shakespeare, who was quoting Erasmus, who was paraphrasing Homer. Who knew dress clothes had a lineage all the way back to the seventh century BC?

Like it or not, scientific literature and our own personal experience demonstrate that what we wear impacts how others perceive us. In the athleisure world in which we live, this kind of research seems dated, but note this: in scientific studies, the person in the white lab coat gets better results than the equally qualified in plain clothes. This actually has everything to do with blessing our community. How we present ourselves influences the way others perceive us.

I'm not suggesting that our clothing will make us better servants of Christ, but I am encouraging us to hear Paul's words in Colossians 3 to "clothe ourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience." When we "dress" this way, it is evident that we truly are, as Paul says, "holy and dearly loved."

Whatever garments you wear, be clothed with the fruit of the Spirit. Then you will be a blessing in your community.

Scripture Insights

I grew up with chronic asthma, that condition where the airways in your lungs narrow and fill with fluid. Breathing becomes difficult, and you feel intense pressure in your chest. There were many times as a boy when it felt like a baby elephant was sitting on my chest. Asthmatic episodes are often called "attacks." Many of those attacks resulted in my parents taking me to the emergency room for relief of those heavy symptoms. Thankfully, by the time I was eighteen, I had pretty much outgrown the worst of this condition, as is common for childhood asthmatics.

In my college years, I began to serve as a sponsor at Nazarene district kids' camps. At one of the earliest of these, a young man experienced a severe asthma attack. Other sponsors became frantic, not knowing how to respond, which only heightened the anxiety of the one suffering. Because I could fully identify with what he was experiencing, I was able to calm and comfort him and give some guidance for treatment to those overseeing the camp.

The God of all comfort knows all the pressure we feel in our lives. He sees the attacks we face. He is with us and for us in every moment of heaviness and pain. He brings us through, and then gives us the grace to help those facing the same kinds of troubles we have endured.

If you feel pressure in your life today, ask the God of all comfort to strengthen you. He will—and then in some moment of trouble, you will be equipped to do the same for another.

Lord, you know what we are facing today. Please be our strength, our shield, and our comfort. And Lord, you know someone else is dealing with the heavy pressures of life today to whom we might bring your comfort and presence. Show us who they are. Send us to them with your love and compassion.

Scripture Insights

In the story Jesus tells about the Good Samaritan, the Samaritan followed the religious leaders who had their chance and failed to bless the victimized man on the side of the road. This amazing Samaritan then becomes a shorthand reference for loving others. He expresses spontaneous concern. He sees a need, and he responds. His generosity is expressed in his detailed care—bandaged wounds, transportation, housing and meals, all expenses paid. This is generosity.

The Samaritan does not act according to personal judgments about the man's worthiness. He is the wrong race, the wrong religion, has no way to make repayment—and maybe his injuries are deserved, who knows. Perhaps this Samaritan was the recipient of abundant grace. Those who have received lavish grace are more apt to give grace. These folks travel through life with a grace "care package" ready to give. As recipients of Christ's grace, we should be prepared to bless others.

May we be like the Good Samaritan. May we have eyes to see needs, hands to serve others, the means to respond generously, and hearts that live our lives out of love for others so that others may see Jesus.

Maybe this is the heart of what Paul is asking—are we willing to give up the comfort of solely enjoying God's freedom and accept the responsibility of serving one another in love?

Scripture Insights

Today's scripture reminds us to do good and to share with others. This admonition comes immediately after encouraging the reader to continually offer to God sacrifices of praise—the fruit of lips that openly profess his name.

Which is more important? Praise or service? Worship or works? By connecting these, the writer is showing us how they are essentially two sides of the same coin. Sincere praise is best followed up with service and generosity to others. Works of service reveal the truth of our professions of faith. Both are important.

We receive in worship so we can give in service. We are encouraged to offer sacrifices of praise and worship as well as sacrifices of good works and generosity. With such sacrifices, Hebrews declares, God is pleased! This is good news. Worship matters. Church matters. Works of service matter as well, and they flow naturally from our worship. One is incomplete without the other.

Through Jesus, and in the name of Jesus, we are called to offer sacrifices of praise as a worshiping community alongside intentional good works of service and generosity to our larger community. We are blessed to be a blessing.

Scripture Insights

Paul says we should do everything in the name of Jesus. Instead, we tend to do mission in the name of our local church, our denomination, or some other way we distinguish ourselves from other Christians. The church has, at times, done damage to Jesus's name in our eagerness to bring the world to him. Sadly, some actions of the church have earned us a bad reputation. Jesus, nevertheless, retains his good character.

There has been a not-so-subtle shift in church culture that comes at the expense of the proclamation of good news in Jesus's name. We might say, let's simply be present in the world, abound in acts of compassion, bless our communities with justice, and do good things as often as possible without the burden or responsibility of proclaiming Jesus.

Nazarenes believe that proclamation, presence (proximity), and purity make the gospel effective! Paul reminds us to tell those to whom we are sent that Jesus sent us and that he alone should get the praise for the life and acts of mission we practice.

Father, help us proclaim Jesus when we love and live among those who desperately need you. When we go to bless our communities, make us bold and not ashamed to proclaim the one who sent us.

Scripture Insights

By nature, I'm a problem solver. It's part of my biological makeup as well as part of the work I do. I want to help. So when someone shows me or tells me about something that is broken, I naturally want to get to work and throw out ideas about how to fix it. Usually, I try diagnosing what happened to make things go wrong in the first place before diving into any resolution. But sometimes, I forget that every problem I encounter has a face or two attached to it. Jesus never forgets this. When he sees a problem, he knows there is a person on the other end.

Today's scripture says he "had compassion." The Greek word underneath our English translation is *splanchna*, which is refers to our "inward parts"—our intestines. So we can paraphrase this verse this way: "When Jesus saw the crowds, his guts hurt!"

In order to bless my community, I think my guts need to hurt a little more at the pain I see all around me.

What is the Spirit saving to you today?

Our Father, Jesus always draws us deeper. May we see people as you see them today, not as problems to solve but as people to bless. May we lead all who follow us with a pain in our gut for those who feel harassed and helpless.

Scripture Insights

When David went through difficulties in his life, he desired to remain teachable, flexible, and adaptable to God's plans. We notice that in today's scripture David reminded himself not to be too wise in his own eyes. The opposite of a united heart is a divided heart, which gives us multiple options, some of which are not pleasing to God. Could David be admitting that his heart is playing tug of war? David's desire in prayer was the undivided heart, singular loyalty to his God.

When Jesus was asked about the greatest commandment, he said, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind" (Matthew 22:37). This totally focused and devoted heart is what God desires from and looks for in us.

Scripture Insights

God is more than a judge casting a decision on our actions or a coach trying to improve our performance. The heart of God is of a parent who loves, delights in, and longs for his children. Jesus is trying to help us see that this is the fundamental nature of our Creator. God is judge and coach, yes, but above all—God is our loving Father.

Before the prodigal son cleaned up his behavior, changed his heart, or made amends for all his mistakes, his father saw him, was full of compassion, and joyously received him. When God's children wander, God longs for us to return. As soon as the father saw the beginnings of the son's movement toward him, the father did not hesitate to run the rest of the way to his son. This father loves and delights in his wayward son. Our God loves and delights in us!

If we begin to let this truth begin to trickle into our internal belief that this is our Creator's heart toward us, it will have a profound impact on the way we see ourselves and others. God longs for your freedom from self-condemnation and the condemnation of others.

Scripture Insights

You have likely heard the phrase "blessed to be a blessing," which originates from the Abrahamic covenant in Genesis 12:2. God would bless Abram and make his name great—so that Abram would be a blessing to others.

Blessing others has a boomerang effect. In Genesis 11, we find the story of the Tower of Babel, where the people desired to build a city with a tower that reached to the heavens. Genesis 11:4 says they wanted to "make a name for [themselves]." In doing so, they would not be scattered across the whole earth. Their selfish desire resulted in the opposite effect. Rather than staying gathered in community, their selfishness led to their scattering. It always does.

By contrast, in Genesis 12, God offers another path. God will bless Abram. Abram isn't blessing himself. God will make Abram's name great. Abram isn't making his own name great. Abram is called to take the incredible blessing of relationship with the Father and use it to bless others. In doing so, guess what? Abram will find community! His people will be rooted in one place and will not be scattered.

If you desire for your church to be a place of true community, then it starts with blessing others.

Father, with the many blessings you have given us, we desire to be a blessing to our communities. Help us to bless our neighbors; as we do so, may they come to know and follow you.

Scripture Insights

The prayer in today's scripture is the assurance that God is the source of blessings. It announces God's desire to bless his people and indicates that blessing is God's idea. Blessing is not something God's people must beg for; it is a matter of receiving it and passing it on to the rest of the world.

This prayer speaks of the light of the presence of the Lord and the result of living in the divine presence. God supplies the wording of this blessing because it articulates his willingness to respond in grace and generosity. The Lord is eager to turn to his people, to smile on them, to protect them, and to provide complete wholeness and peace.

The prerequisite for this abundant and unlimited flow of blessings is the presence of the Lord. The implication is that blessing is God's initiative, so it is essential that all our efforts to bless our communities be the result of our seeking God's direction. And, since God is the source, we can be assured he will provide the necessary resources. Most important, we can proceed with boldness and confidence because we know we are asking and acting according to his will.

Father, help us not to hoard your blessings for ourselves but to spread them to all the nations, according to your will and directions. Help us advance your purposes by prioritizing the good news of Jesus Christ.

Scripture Insights

It happens in the marketplace—where pressures mount, where fear and suspicion drive us to label instead of listen, where uncertainty pushes us into defensive postures, where "the mouth of the wicked" captures so much airtime. Into this space—beyond the safety of the sanctuary and the self-assuring echo chambers of social media—venture the upright. They cannot be less daring, for their hearts have been captured by the mandate to be imitators of God and live a life of love (see Ephesians 5:1–2). For them, only one label applies to everyone: neighbor.

They see their neighbors, look into their eyes, learn their names, hear their stories. Against the impulse to gain the upper hand or eliminate risks to their own resources, the upright walk in the marketplace with humility and generosity of spirit—listening, learning, engaging with integrity and sensitivity, rooted in Christ, clothed with compassion and kindness (see Proverbs 11:1–10; Colossians 3:12). They cross all kinds of barriers and divides. Like the Samaritan. Like Jesus, who dared to be fully present in real moments with the wayward and despised, exemplifying and offering life.

Hope takes hold in spaces laid waste by the wicked. With each embrace of neighbor, the entire community is uplifted.

Lord Jesus, examine with us our last twenty-four hours, these last seven days. Open our eyes to see all around us always and only neighbors, pursued by you. Let our lives become the uplifting blessing of the upright.

Scripture Insights

A man went to visit Yosemite National Park, but because of a mix-up in his schedule, he wound up with only one hour to spend there. He rushed over to the ranger headquarters and said, "I only have one hour to spend in the park—tell me what I should see."

The park ranger said, "If you only have one hour to spend at Yosemite, then my advice is to climb up to the tallest observation point, look over the entire park, and just cry—because one hour is not enough time to do it justice."

I think about that story when I read this passage. Paul was amazed at the sheer magnitude of these blessings from God. The blessings he writes about in the verses that follow are: hope (1:18); power (1:19); peace (2:14); freedom and confidence (3:12); strength (3:16); grace (4:7); the armor of God (6:11). And here is the best part. They are all ours—every single one of them!

This thought is expressed well in the familiar hymn "Great Is Thy Faithfulness": Pardon for sin and a peace that endureth; thine own dear presence to cheer and to guide; strength for today and bright hope for tomorrow; blessings all mine, with ten thousand beside!

Galatians 3:14

He redeemed us in order that the blessing given to Abraham might come to the Gentiles through Christ Jesus, so that by faith we might receive the promise of the Spirit.

Scripture Insights

Several years ago, I heard the firsthand-account story "Let My People Go," by Cal Bombay of Toronto, Ontario, Canada. In an unnamed, war-ravaged nation, slavery was a way of life. People in the north captured women and children from the south—many of them Christian—and sold them as servants and concubines. The stories were devastating. Bombay shared the heartrending, sometimes infuriating account of the 1997 mission to return the slaves to their southern homeland, to buy or to redeem them, and to set them free again in the name of the Lord.

The word "redeem" literally means "to buy back." Jesus's death *redeemed* not only Abraham's descendants but also *every* nation (see Genesis 12:3). The blessing given to Abraham is something far more precious than prosperity or honour; it is the blessing of a right standing with God through faith. This same blessing is for all who would by faith come to Jesus Christ! What freedom!

Church, this blessing we are given is too spectacular to keep within our own walls. We must share this good news of redemption with our neighbours, that they too may be blessed by right standing with God! Can you testify to receiving such a blessing?

Today's Prayer

Precious Saviour, may your sacrifice for our redemption not be forgotten. Holy Spirit, we receive you by faith. Father, give us the opportunity and the boldness to share this blessing with those who hunger for such good news.

1 Peter 3:8

Finally, all of you, be like-minded, be sympathetic, love one another, be compassionate and humble.

Scripture Insights

Why is love listed third in today's scripture? Peter's teaching in the chapters leading up to this verse is radically countercultural to his contemporaries and deeply offensive to our modern ears. This verse serves as both a concluding exhortation for what has come before and an introduction to what follows. Peter directs his teaching to those who have received the gospel and desire to faithfully live it out in the midst of the world we find ourselves in.

Peter exhorts his readers to embody five virtues. The first, "be like-minded," and the last, "be humble," deal with understanding in community and, in fact, share a common root word. The second, "be sympathetic," and the fourth, "be compassionate," deal with emotion and passion.

This leaves the third, "love one another," standing on its own. In his *New Beacon Bible Commentary* on 1 Peter, Dan Powers recognizes the chiastic structure of this list that is more common in Hebrew literature than Greek (a-b-c-b-a).

The chiastic structure gives us the key clue as to why love comes third in the list. It is the cardinal virtue, the hinge on which all the other virtues rely, and it is expressed in Christian community by our willingness to be of one mind (like-minded and humble) and one passion (sympathetic, compassionate).

Today's Prayer

Our Father in heaven, may your Word become the prevailing reality of our lives together. May we experience these virtues in fellowship with one another as we humbly choose to agree with your revealed truth and passionately participate in each other's suffering. We pray this in the name of Jesus and for his sake.

Pentecost Sunday, May 19, 2024



Luke 24:49

I am going to send you what my Father has promised; but stay in the city until you have been clothed with power from on high.

Scripture Insights

Pentecost started as a sit-in: the last recorded words of Jesus were "to stay in the city." Taking the gospel to the nations required being "clothed with power from on high." The word "power" in the Old Testament refers to great human strength (think Samson, for instance). The word in the New Testament refers not to human strength but to divine power. The Greek word is *dunamis*, and from it we get the English words "dynamo" and "dynamite." Divine power is electric and explosive.

Jesus operated "in the power of the Spirit" (Luke 4:14), and he promised to clothe us in that same power. It is a power that can do immeasurably more than we can ask or imagine (Ephesians 3:20). It is a resurrection power (Ephesians 3:18–20). Once they received that kind of power, a sit-in was not possible. That power resulted in being sent out to accomplish the impossible! As Samuel Chadwick noted, on the Day of Pentecost, "no one needed to ask if they had received the Holy Ghost. Fire is self-evident. So is power!"

Today's Prayer

On this Day of Pentecost, we ask for a fresh clothing with your divine power, an "immeasurably more" kind of power, a resurrection power, a power that will be self-evident and that will move us from sitting in to being sent out!
